But this revisionism clung to the old socialist dogmas and refused a total break with the system and the effort eventually failed. The result was the emergence of a dissident counterculture rejecting the system entirely. Independent social movements such as unofficial peace groups and trade unions like Solidarity have given this counterculture a major role in Eastern Europe whilst the ruling elites have responded with confusion. Tismaneanu concludes that the only hope for the anti-totalitarian intellectuals of Eastern Europe is to oppose the regimes with non-Marxist ideas otherwise they will be permanently reduced to the status of a hopeless albeit heroic minority.
