Not as a Duty Only Henry Gullett,1976 *Not as a Duty Only* Henry Gullett,1976 **Sand and Steel** Peter Caddick-Adams,2019-04-22 Part of a trilogy covering the last year of fighting in the European theater of World War II and in time for the 75th anniversary of D Day Sand and Steel gives us the full story of the Allied invasion of France Jungle Warfare John Cross,2008-02-21 The physical conditions of jungle warfare and the closeness of contact with the enemy pose unique problems and call for special soldiering skills Colonel John Cross a life long Gurkha officer has an unrivalled knowledge of this demanding warfare and uses it to best advantage in this instructive yet personal account of techniques and experiences He uses examples from British and Japanese sides in the Second World War and goes on to demonstrate how tactics and strategy developed in the Malay Borneo and Indo China theatres thereafter He laces his work with vivid recollections and assessments of friend and foe along with entertaining anecdotes from a wide range of sources This excellent book offers a perfect blend of factual military history and personal recollection and the reader gains a unique insight into this most challenging form of warfare Bridging Australia and Japan: Volume 2 Keiko Tamura,Arthur Stockwin,2020-08-23 This book is volume two of the writings of David Sissons who first established his academic career as a political scientist specialising in Japanese politics and later shifted his focus to the history of Australia Japan relations In this volume we reproduce his writings on Japanese politics the Pacific War and Australian war crimes trials after the war He was a pioneer in these fields carrying out research across cultural and language borders and influenced numerous researchers who followed in his footsteps Much of what he wrote however remained unpublished at the time of his death in 2006 and so the editors have included a selection of his hitherto unpublished work along with some of his published writings *Breaking Japanese Diplomatic Codes* edited by Desmond Ball and Keiko Tamura was published in 2013 and the first volume of *Bridging Australia and Japan* was published in 2016 This book completes this series which reproduces many of David Sissons writings The current volume covers a wide range of topics from Japanese wartime intentions towards Australia the Cowra Breakout and Sissons early writings on Japanese politics Republished in this volume is his comprehensive essay on the Australian war crimes trials which influenced the field of military justice research Georgina Fitzpatrick and Keiko Tamura have also contributed essays reflecting on his research Sissons was an extraordinarily meticulous researcher leaving no stone unturned in his search for accuracy and completeness of understanding and should be considered one of Australia s major historians His writings deal not only with diplomatic negotiations and decision making but also the lives of ordinary and often nameless people and their engagements with their host society His warm humanity in recording ordinary people s lives as well as his balanced examination of historical incidents and issues from both Australian and Japanese perspectives are hallmarks of his scholarship **The Battle of Bardia** Craig Stockings,2011-07-01 On the morning of 3 January 1941 Australians of the 6th Division led an assault against the Italian colonial fortress village of Bardia in Libya not far from the Egyptian Libyan frontier

The ensuing battle was the second of the First Libyan Campaign but the first battle of the Second World War planned and fought predominantly by Australians. The fortress fell to the attackers a little over two days after the attack began in what could only be described as a remarkable victory. At a cost of 130 killed and 326 wounded, the 6th Division captured around 40 000 Italian prisoners and very large quantities of military stores and equipment. The victory was heralded at the time in Australia as one of the greatest military achievements of that nation's military history. Quite soon afterwards, however, overshadowed perhaps by Rommel's subsequent desert advances, the tragedy in Greece and the war in the Pacific, Bardia slipped from the public mind. Very few Australians today have heard of the battle. This book attempts to bring Bardia back into the light.

Their continual retreat paved the way for subsequent successful Allied campaigns in the South West Pacific theatre. However, victory came at a high cost, with over 2000 casualties within a fortnight for the Allies, while Japanese losses exceeded that number nearly fourfold. The exact toll on the Papua New Guinean village people remains unknown but undoubtedly significant. Dr Howie Willis challenges previous military histories that have marginalized the Papua New Guineans, highlighting their essential role as the third party to the conflict. By focusing on the village communities, he illuminates the horrific impact of the war on their lands and lives, offering a comprehensive and inclusive narrative. Operation Postern provides readers with an opportunity to revisit and reinterpret this crucial battle that shaped the course of history. Dr Howie Willis' extensive knowledge and meticulous attention to detail make this book a valuable contribution to the understanding of the Pacific War.
