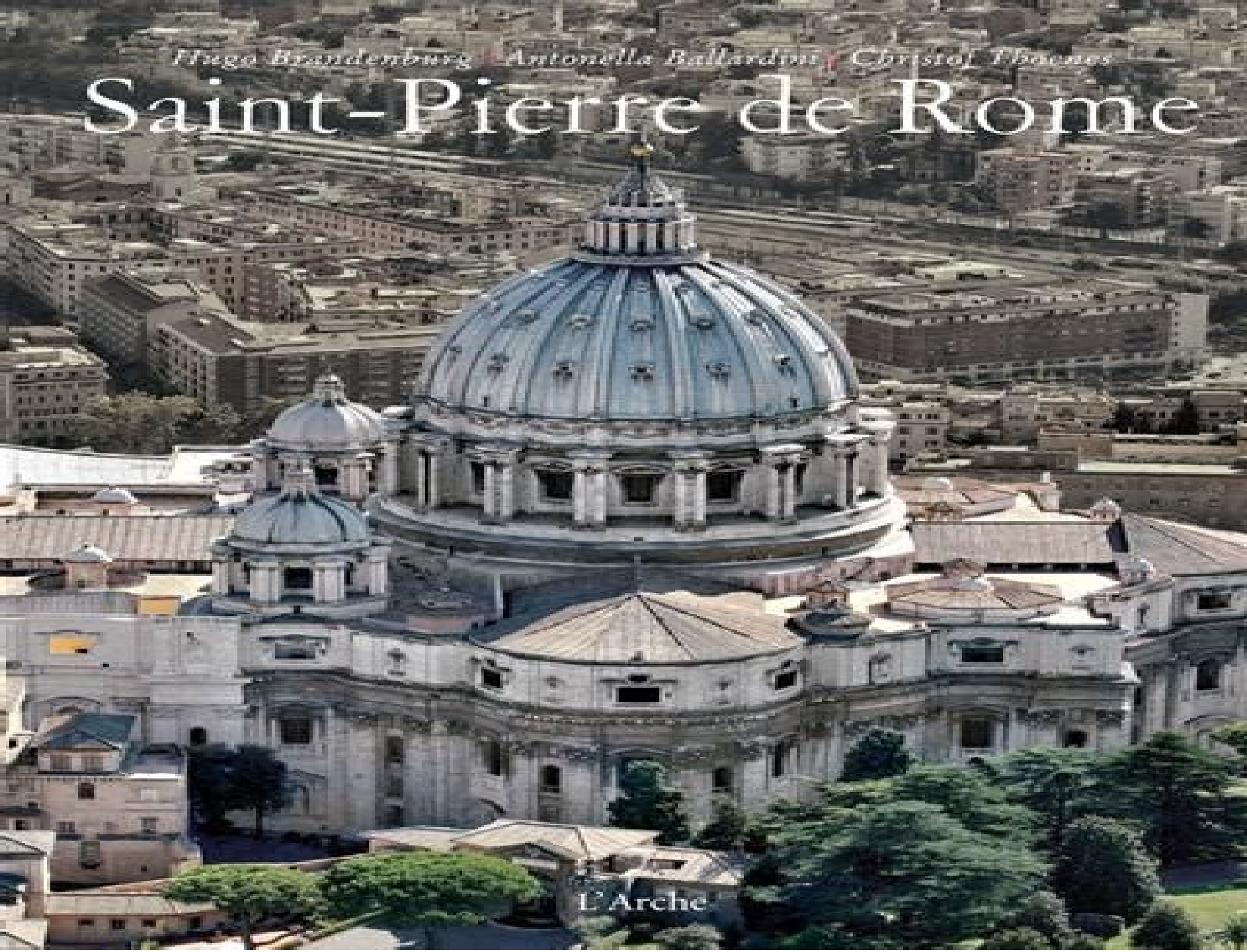

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Understanding Early Christian Art Robin M. Jensen, 2023-08-29 Surveying the content and character of early Christian iconography from the third to the sixth century CE this substantially revised and updated new edition of *Understanding Early Christian Art* makes the critical tools of art historians accessible to students It opens by discussing a series of questions pertaining to the evidence itself and how scholars through the centuries have regarded this material as expressing and transmitting aspects of the developing faith and practice of early adherents of Christianity It considers possible sources for the various motifs and the complex relationship between words and images as well as the importance of studying visual and material culture alongside theological and liturgical texts Rather than organising surviving examples by medium or chronology the chapters categorise the evidence according to their general iconographic type such as generic symbols biblical narratives and portraits Each chapter takes up important questions of visual culture formal style and the ways in which the iconography is distinct from or shows parallels with contemporary documentary sources like sermons exegetical works catechetical lectures or dogmatic treatises Concluding with a discussion of the late emerging depictions of Jesus s crucifixion resurrection and ascension it remains a valuable guide to comprehending the complex theology history and context of Christian art Augmented by over 140 full colour images accompanied by parallel text the interdisciplinary and boundary breaking approach taken in this extensively revised edition of *Understanding Early Christian Art* enables students and scholars in fields such as religion and art history to further their understanding and knowledge of the art of the early Christian era

Sacred Stimulus Galit Noga-Banai, 2018-06-01 *Sacred Stimulus* offers a thorough exploration of Jerusalem s role in the formation and formulation of Christian art in Rome during the fourth and fifth centuries The visual vocabulary discussed by Galit Noga Banai gives an alternative access point to the mnemonic efforts conceived while Rome converted to Christianity not in comparison to pagan art in Rome not as reflecting the struggle with the emergence of New Rome in the East Constantinople but rather as visual expressions of the confrontation with earthly Jerusalem and its holy places After all Jerusalem is where the formative events of Christianity occurred and were memorialized *Sacred Stimulus* argues that already in the second half of the fourth century Rome constructed its own set of holy sites and foundational myths while expropriating for its own use some of Jerusalem s sacred relics legends and sites Relying upon well known and central works of art including mosaic decoration sarcophagi wall paintings portable art and architecture Noga Banai exposes the omnipresence of Jerusalem and its position in the genesis of Christian art in Rome Noga Banai s consideration of earthly Jerusalem as a conception that Rome used or had to take into account in constructing its own new Christian ideological and cultural topography of the past sheds light on connections and analogies that have not necessarily been preserved in the written evidence and offers solutions to long standing questions regarding specific motifs and scenes Paul the Martyr David L. Eastman, 2011 Ancient iconography of Paul is dominated by one image Paul as martyr Whether he is carrying a

sword the traditional instrument of his execution or receiving a martyr's crown from Christ the apostle was remembered and honored for his faithfulness to the point of death. As a result, Christians created a cult of Paul centered on particular holy sites and characterized by practices such as the telling of stories, pilgrimage and the veneration of relics. This study integrates literary, archaeological, artistic and liturgical evidence to describe the development of the Pauline cult within the cultural context of the late antique West.

Urban Developments in Late Antique and Medieval Rome Gregor Kalas, Ann Dijk, 2025-10-01. With its official recognition by the Roman state, the Christian community suddenly enjoyed the sympathy of the highest authorities, wide public attention and a great afflux, and with imperial support architectural masterpieces were erected: the Lateran Basilica, St Peter's and San Paolo fuori le mura, whose dimensions and magnificence bore every comparison with pagan sanctuaries. The great rise in martyr worship furthermore prompted the construction of numerous memorial churches outside the city gates, which at the same time served as burial grounds for believers. Rome was transformed from capital of the Empire to capital of Christianity, boasting the tombs of the two prime apostles, Peter and Paul, and numerous other witnesses of Christ. Alongside these monuments of papal and imperial representation, several *tituli* (parish churches) were founded along the main thoroughfares inside the city to create visible landmarks of Christianity and satisfy the pastoral needs of an ever-growing community. Focusing on these formative centuries of Christianity, from the reign of Constantine until the emergence of the Medieval world order in the Carolingian age, Hugo Brandenburg offers a broad panoramic view of Christian church architecture in Rome from its conception to the establishment of canonical church types. Throughout, the author treats the archaeological remains as speaking testimonies, articulating the intentions, motivations and self-perception of Rome's early Christian community. This lucid and detailed exposition of more than 50 early churches of Rome, from the fourth to the seventh century, which draws together archaeological, documentary and literary sources, will appeal to the layman and the specialist alike. It contains an up-to-date bibliography on each subject and gives ample space to the discussion of recent developments in the field, whereby Hugo Brandenburg offers his own well-founded interpretations of the evidence and shows his immense expertise of early Christian

architecture The present work is lavishly illustrated with original plans and drawings and exclusive photographs especially taken for this volume which allow an unusually detailed visual insight into the sacred architecture of early Christian Rome
