Module 16: Air Circulation Systems

Uneven solar heating—oceanic heat flow

- Equator has more heat and polar regions have less heat
- The atmosphere circulates. As you go higher into the troposphere, the temperature decreases (increases again in the stratosphere)

Physical Properties of the Atmosphere

- Warm air is less dense than cold air (heat rises!)
- Moist air is less dense than dry air (water vapor is lighter than nitrogen and oxygen)
- Warm area at the equator rises, which creates a low pressure zone and since it's colder at the top of the troposphere, the air gets cold as it moves along
 - It then creates a high pressure zone when it is packed closer together
- Air moves from high pressure to low pressure

Movements in Air

- Convection cell on different part of the earth where wind always moves from high to low pressure in our idealized model
- Coriolis effect: deflection of moving objects over long distances due to the rotation of the earth
 - Effect is creating over objects that move long distances across latitudes
 - Maximum at the poles, none at equator
 - Deflected to the right in northern hemisphere, to the left in southern

Global Atmospheric Circulation

- Greater heating over equator: air expands, decreases in density, rises
- Air rises, cools due to temperatures in upper troposphere, and eventually increases in density to sink
- Circulation cells change based on water vapor content and temperature
- Different circulation cells:
 - o Hadley (0-30
 - o Ferrel (30-60)
 - Polar (60-90)
- High pressure zones: (air moves towards the surface... cold sinks)
 - o Subtropical highs, polar highs, clear skies
- Low pressure zones (air moves away from the surface... heat rises)
 - o Equatorial lows, subpolar lows, overcast skies with precipitation
