

North America Tlingit oral histories and Russian eyewitness accounts bring this history to life shedding light on events both inspiring and infamous the Massacre at Refuge Rock one of Native America's worst atrocities the Survival March the perilous Tlingit retreat to avoid Russian capture and enslavement and the cutthroat competition between the U S and Russia to control the northern Pacific Ultimately The Last Stand of the Raven Clan chronicles the determined struggle for survival of the Tlingit people in their ancestral homeland and places the Battle of Sitka in its rightful spot as a key turning point in North American history
