Definition of Democracy

- It is defined as a form of government where rulers are elected by the choice of people.
- So, the difference between democratic and non-democratic governments is that the power of electing their representative is in people's hands.

Examples of non-democratic governments

- In Myanmar, the army controller becomes the ruler and people over there have no role to play in electing their representative.
- In Saudi Arabia, the representatives are from royal families, this is the base on which they qualify to become kings. Here also, people have no role to play in making decisions.

Notes on Democracy is a 1926 book by American journalist, satirist, and cultural critic H L Mencken. Notes on Democracy is a critique of democracy. The book places political leaders into two categories: the demagogue who preaches doctrines he knows to be untrue to men he knows to be idiots, and the demasclave who listens to what these idiots have to say and then pretends that he believes it himself. Mencken depicts politicians as men who have sold their honor for their jobs. Writing for The Saturday Review of Literature, Walter Lippmann described the book as a tremendous polemic which destroys by rendering it ridiculous and unfashionable the democratic tradition of the American pioneers and likens Notes on Democracy to The Social Contract by Jean Jacques Rousseau, but Lippmann also criticizes Mencken by saying the chief weakness of the book as a book of ideas arises out of this naive contrast in Mr Mencken's mind between the sordid reality he knows and the splendid society he imagines. What is political independence? As a political act, what was it sanctioned to accomplish? Is formal colonialism over or a condition in the present, albeit mutated and evolved? In Critique of Political Decolonization, Bernard Forjwuor challenges what in normative scholarship has become a persistent conflation of two different concepts: political decolonization and political independence. This scholarly volume is an antinormative and critical refutation of the decolonial accomplishment of political independence or self-determination in Ghana. He argues that political independence is insufficiently a decolonial claim because it is framed within the context of a country where a permanent colonial settlement was never deemed necessary for the consolidation of future colonial political obligations. So while territorial dissolution was politically engineered by Ghanaians, the colonial merely

reconstitutes itself in different legal and ideological forms Forjwuor offers new methodological theoretical and conceptual approaches to engaging the questions of colonialism political independence political decolonization justice and freedom and constructs multiple conceptual bridges between traditional disciplinary fields of inquiry including politics history law African studies economic history critical theory and philosophy and political theory Using the Ghanaian experience as a rich case study Forjwuor rethinks what colonialism and decolonization mean and asserts that decolonization is primarily a question of justice

the first comprehensive biography of Grundy since 1940 J Roderick Heller reveals how Grundy's life typifies the archetypal post founding fathers generation that forged America's culture and institutions After his birth in Virginia Grundy moved west at age five to the region that would become Kentucky where he lost three brothers in Indian wars He earned a law degree joined the legislature and quickly became Henry Clay's main rival At age thirty one after rising to become chief justice of Kentucky Grundy moved to Tennessee where voters soon elected him to Congress In Washington Grundy proved so voracious a proponent of the War of 1812 that a popular slogan of the day blamed the war on Madison Grundy and the Devil A pivotal U S senator during the presidency of Andrew Jackson Grundy also served as Martin Van Buren's attorney general and developed a close association with his law student and political protégé James K Polk Grundy championed the ideals of the American West and as Heller demonstrates his dominating belief equality in access to power motivated many of his political battles Aristocratic federalism threatened the principles of the Revolution Grundy asserted and he opposed fetters on freedom of opportunity whether from government or entrenched economic elites Although widely known as a politician Grundy achieved even greater fame as a criminal lawyer Of the purported 185 murder defendants that he represented only one was hanged At a time when criminal trials served as popular entertainment Grundy's mere appearance in a courtroom drew spectators from miles around and his legal reputation soon spread nationwide One nineteenth century Nashvillian declared that Grundy could stand on a street corner and talk the cobblestones into life Shifting seamlessly within the worlds of law entrepreneurship and politics Felix Grundy exemplified the questing mobile society of early nineteenth century America With *Democracy's Lawyer* Heller firmly establishes Grundy as a powerful player and personality in early American law and politics

California and the Melancholic American Identity in Joan Didion's Novels Exiled from Eden focuses on the concept of Californian identity in the fiction of Joan Didion. This identity is understood as melancholic in the sense that the critics following the tradition of both Sigmund Freud and Walter Benjamin use the word. The book traces the progress of the way Californian identity is portrayed in Joan Didion's novels starting with the first two in which California plays the central role: *Run River* and *Play It As It Lays* through *A Book of Common Prayer* to *Democracy* and *The Last Thing He Wanted* where California functions only as a distant point of reference receding to the background of Didion's interests. Curiously enough, Didion presents Californian history as a history of white settlement disregarding whole chapters of the history of the region in which the Californios and Native Americans among other groups played a crucial role. It is this reticence that the monograph sees as the main problem of Didion's fiction and presents it as the silent center of gravity in Didion's oeuvre. The monograph proposes to see the melancholy expressed by Didion's fiction organized into four losses: of Nature, History, Ethics, and Language around which the main analytical chapters are constructed. What remains unrepresented and silenced comes back to haunt Didion's fiction and it results in a melancholic portrayal of California and its identity which is the central theme this monograph addresses.
