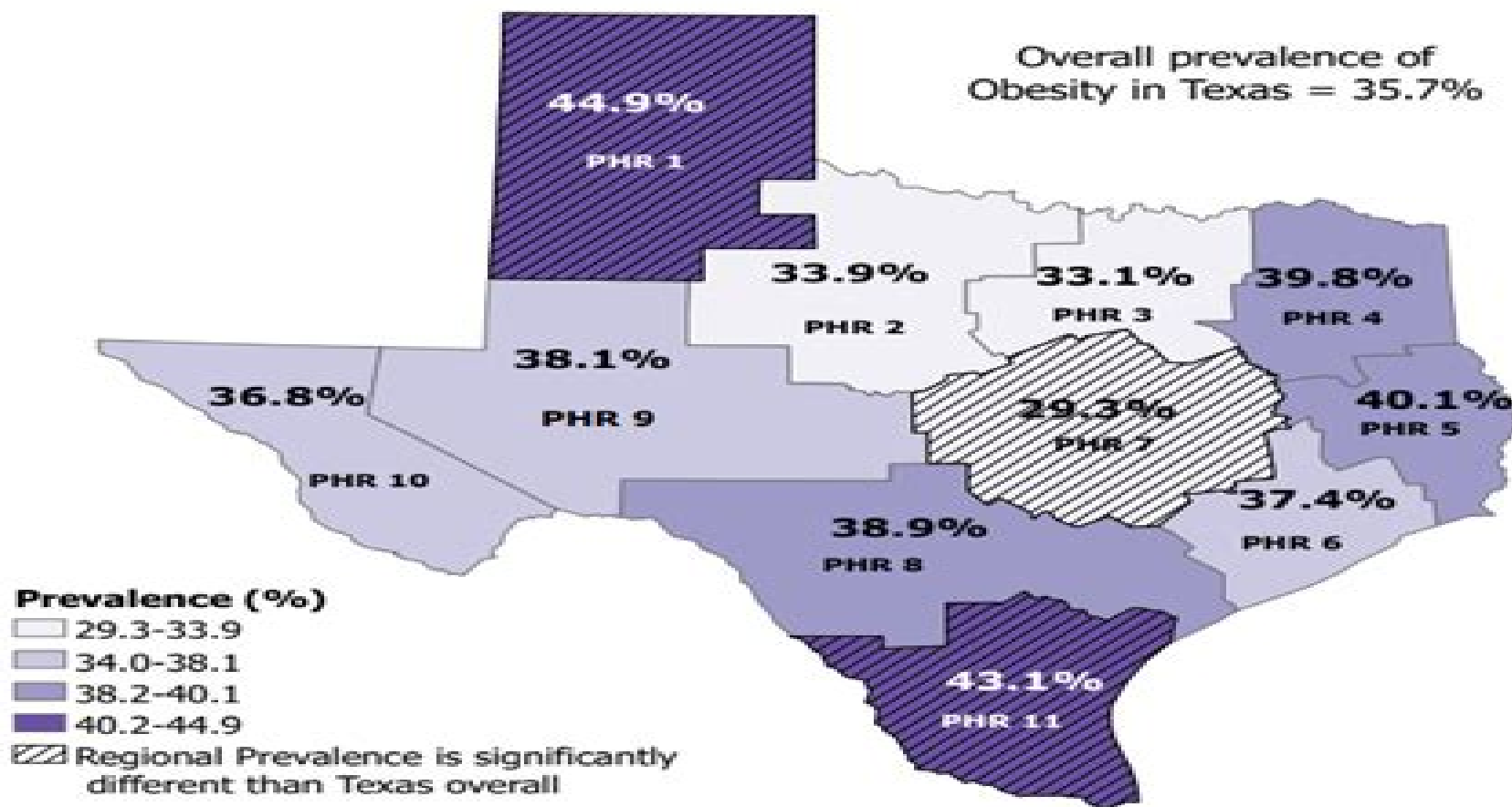


Prevalence of Obesity among Adults, by Public Health Region (PHR), Texas, 2020

Childhood Obesity Prevention in Texas Institute of Medicine, Food and Nutrition Board, 2010-01-01 Childhood Obesity Prevention in Texas summarizes the information gathered at a workshop held February 5-6, 2009 in Austin, Texas. At this workshop, committee members met with Texas lawmakers, public officials, and community leaders to exchange ideas and to view first-hand strategies that are being implemented effectively at the state and local levels to prevent and reverse childhood obesity.
