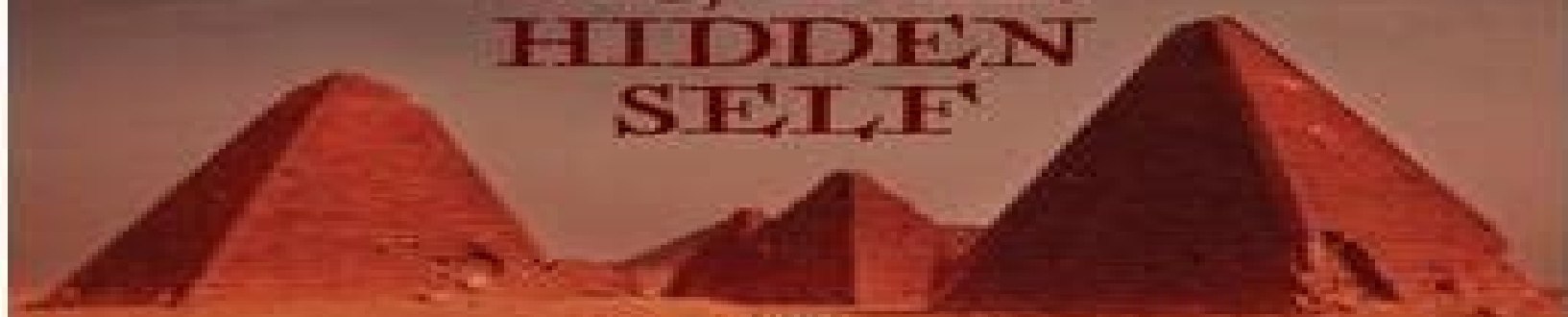

In taking on these questions, Franks engages with physical culture and dress reform media, modern artwork that adapts Graeco-Roman traditions, anthropological texts, art histories of ancient Greece, film advertising, and medical reporting on women's health.
