

## Politics and the English Language by George Orwell

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### Problem Description

In his article "Politics and the English Language," George Orwell discusses the problems of political literature. He points out several issues that can be resolved to stop the language from declining. Orwell believes that the written English language is full of unnecessary or outdated phrases and empty words. Moreover, the writer insists that contemporary political language is structured in a way that confuses the reader and hides the true meaning behind some inflated statements. In this case, the examples of bad writing all possess the same qualities, which the author deems to be unacceptable to use. Although he mostly focuses on political language, it is clear that Orwell wants to affect other types of writing as well. For instance, he briefly mentions scientific papers, while criticizing the use of Latin and Greek words. Nevertheless, the writer mostly focuses on the political use of language, stating that one can manipulate the audience through complicated wording and structure.

After analyzing several sentences and outlining the main flaws that plague the written language, Orwell suggests six rules which one can follow to write, concisely, and sincerely. These rules sound definitive as five out of six of them use such words as "never" and "always." For instance, the first rule states that one should "never use a metaphor, simile, or another figure of speech which you are used to seeing in print" (Orwell). Other rules forbid the use of long words instead of short ones, passive structures where one can use active ones, and foreign phrases, scientific terms, and professionalisms instead of their English equivalents. Moreover, the author argues that all unnecessary words should be cut out whenever possible. The last rule serves as a loophole to all the other ones, stating that an author should break all rules not to sound "outright barbarous" (Orwell). Orwell's problem received many responses as scholars and authors continue to debate over its significance.

believes to be a close association between bad prose and oppressive ideology In our time political speech and writing are largely the defence of the indefensible Things like the continuance of British rule in India the Russian purges and deportations the dropping of the atom bombs on Japan can indeed be defended but only by arguments which are too brutal for most people to face and which do not square with the professed aims of political parties Thus political language has to consist largely of euphemism question begging and sheer cloudy vagueness Defenceless villages are bombarded from the air the inhabitants driven out into the countryside the cattle machine gunned the huts set on fire with incendiary bullets this is called pacification Millions of peasants are robbed of their farms and sent trudging along the roads with no more than they can carry this is called transfer of population or rectification of frontiers People are imprisoned for years without trial or shot in the back of the neck or sent to die of scurvy in Arctic lumber camps this is called elimination of unreliable elements Such phraseology is needed if one wants to name things without calling up mental pictures of them One of Orwell s points is The great enemy of clear language is insincerity When there is a gap between one s real and one s declared aims one turns as it were instinctively to long words and exhausted idioms like a cuttlefish spurting out ink The insincerity of the writer perpetuates the decline of the language as people particularly politicians Orwell later notes attempt to disguise their intentions behind euphemisms and convoluted phrasing Orwell says that this decline is self perpetuating He argues that it is easier to think with poor English because the language is in decline and as the language declines foolish thoughts become even easier reinforcing the original cause A man may take to drink because he feels himself to be a failure and then fail all the more completely because he drinks It is rather the same thing that is happening to the English language It becomes ugly and inaccurate because our thoughts are foolish but the slovenliness of our language makes it easier to have foolish thoughts

Remedy of Six Rules Orwell said it was easy for his contemporaries to slip into bad writing of the sort he had described and that the temptation to use meaningless or hackneyed phrases was like a packet of aspirins always at one's elbow In particular such phrases are always ready to form the writer's thoughts for him to save him the bother of thinking or writing clearly However he concluded that the progressive decline of the English language was reversible and suggested six rules which he claimed would prevent many of these faults although one could keep all of them and still write bad English Never use a metaphor simile or other figure of speech which you are used to seeing in print Examples that Orwell gave included ring the changes Achilles heel swan song and hotbed He described such phrases as dying metaphors and argued that they were used without knowing what was truly being said Furthermore he said that using metaphors of this kind made the original meaning of the phrases meaningless because those who used them did not know their original meaning He wrote that some metaphors now current have been twisted out of their original meaning without those who use them even being aware of the fact Never use a long word where a short one will do If it is possible to cut a word out always cut it out Never use the passive where you can use the active Never use a foreign phrase a scientific word or a jargon word if you can think of an everyday English equivalent Break any of these rules sooner than say anything outright barbarous
