Here combined all our given, upon which the ship righted a little. We were then under a necessity of letting all our sleves out of irons, to eache in pumping and bulling.

"Thursday marning being medicate, having gained about firms that on the ship, we found every mak in the hold store to pieces, so that we only second a based of floor, 10 lbs. of board, recenty-five gallions of whee, been, and should, and twenty-five gallions of spicits. The seconds and slaves were employed all this day in pumping and beling; the yamps were frequently chaland, and brought up great quantities of exact. We were obliged to boist one of the pumps up, and put it down the quarter deck baselowsy. A ship this day have slown upon us, and, though very near, and we making every signal of distance, she would not speak to us.

"On Priday, the case theses being very sullets and socially, having had no sustaneous of any kind for firsty eight hours, except a draw, we gut use half of the strongest of them in lease.
