The model questions advocates for the creation of a particular guideline that novice and professional practitioners should use to achieve a particular goal, as Jasper (2003, p99) calls it "real world of practice." The model can enable practitioners to construct a workable Action Plan to allow them to figure out the most appropriate approach to handle a particular condition and enable the affected individual to adapt to new life skills fast and easy.
