Reflections of a Mongolian Shaman Shaman Byampadorj Dondog, 2014 Shaman Byampadorj s wonderful book personal reflections shaman poems and advice He is of the greatest living shamans Mongolia today and has made major contribution the revival and preservation ancient tradition legacy that was strongly oppressed by the Communists during long period of Soviet domination In one Byampadori's reminiscences this book he mentions how his mother passed in early 1990 just after Communism fell and regained religious freedom He mentions how his mother so delighted see a new temple being re consecrated and spiritual practitioners once again being allowed to engage in their religious practices without fear reprisals Byampadorj concludes account stating that his mother passed away quietly and peacefully day reciting her mantras as she slipped to the side Byampadori does not dwell on the years of oppression rather simply alludes them statements like this made in passing many great Mongols he prefers to focus on happier thoughts Shaman Byampadorj s book has seen half dozen editions in Mongolia and in each edition had new songs and poems added well some older ones dropped out have mainly chosen materials from the third and fourth editions **Lesser Dragons** Michael Dillon, 2018-05-15 Lesser Dragons is a timely introduction to the fascinating complex and vital world of China's national minorities Drawing on firsthand fieldwork in several minority areas Michael Dillon introduces us to the major non Han peoples of China including the Mongols the Tibetans the Uyghur of Xinjiang and the Manchus and traces the evolution of their relationship with the Han Chinese majority With chapters devoted to each of the most important minority groups and an additional chapter exploring the parallel but very different world of inter ethnic relations in Taiwan Lesser Dragons will interest anyone eager to understand the reality behind regional conflicts increasingly covered by global media From the tense security situation in Xinjiang to China's attitude toward Tibet and the Dalai Lama to the resistance efforts of Mongolian herders losing traditional grasslands Dillon's book both examines clich's such as those found in the Chinese press which often portrays ethnic minorities as colorful but marginal people and defies expectations He shows us how these minority peoples religions cultures and above all languages mark these groups as distinct from the Chinese majority distinct yet endangered by the systemic forces of integration Mongolia Michael Dillon, 2019-11-28 Mongolia remains a beautiful barren land of spectacularly clothed horse riders nomadic romance and windswept landscape But modern Mongolia is now caught between two giants China and Russia and known to be home to enormous mineral resources they are keen to exploit China is expanding economically into the region buying up mining interests and strengthening its control over Inner Mongolia Michael Dillon one of the foremost experts on the region seeks to tell the modern history of this fascinating country. human imagination made by shamans and the cognitive techniques they developed over the centuries Northern Shamans travel in mind in ways that appear mysterious to Westerners but which rely on the human capacity of imagination They perceive themselves simultaneously in two types of space one visible the other invisible putting them in contact and establishing links with non human beings in their surroundings Shamans share their experience of mind travel with their patients families or the wider community allowing them to participate in their odyssey through the invisible St panoff offers an anthropological reflection on the relationships between our uses of the imagination our relationships with the environment and the emergence of social hierarchies This work will appeal to anthropologists as well as to anyone interested in learning about the power of imagination from the masters of the invisible the shamans of the Far North Customs in the Yuan Dynasty Li Shi, The book is the volume of History of Customs in the Yuan Dynasty among a series of books of Deep into China Histories The earliest known written records of the history of China date from as early as 1250 BC from the Shang dynasty c 1600 1046 BC and the Bamboo Annals 296 BC describe a Xia dynasty c 2070 1600 BC before the Shang but no writing is known from the period The Shang ruled in the Yellow River valley which is commonly held to be the cradle of Chinese civilization However Neolithic civilizations originated at various cultural centers along both the Yellow River and Yangtze River These Yellow River and Yangtze civilizations arose millennia before the Shang With thousands of years of continuous history China is one of the world's oldest civilizations and is regarded as one of the cradles of civilization The Zhou dynasty 1046 256 BC supplanted the Shang and introduced the concept of the Mandate of Heaven to justify their rule The central Zhou government began to weaken due to external and internal pressures in the 8th century BC and the country eventually splintered into smaller states during the Spring and Autumn period These states became independent and warred with one another in the following Warring States period Much of traditional Chinese culture literature and philosophy first developed during those troubled times In 221 BC Qin Shi Huang conquered the various warring states and created for himself the title of Huangdi or emperor of the Qin marking the beginning of imperial China However the oppressive government fell soon after his death and was supplanted by the longer lived Han dynasty 206 BC 220 AD Successive dynasties developed bureaucratic systems that enabled the emperor to control vast territories directly In the 21 centuries from 206 BC until AD 1912 routine administrative tasks were handled by a special elite of scholar officials Young men well versed in calligraphy history literature and philosophy were carefully selected through difficult government examinations China's last dynasty was the Qing 1644 1912 which was replaced by the Republic of China in 1912 and in the mainland by the People's Republic of China in 1949 Chinese history has alternated between periods of political unity and peace and periods of war and failed statehood the most recent being the Chinese Civil War 1927 1949 China was occasionally dominated by steppe peoples most of whom were eventually assimilated into the Han Chinese culture and population Between eras of multiple kingdoms and warlordism Chinese dynasties have ruled parts or all of China in some eras control
