Bibliographic Essay

This bibliographic essay is a selective compilation and annotation of existing literature on drug-control policy. It includes both historical and relevant contemporary literature. With the exception of two Ph.D. dissertations and a number of articles, the emphasis is upon books written largely by scholars and journalists that elucidate the history of drug policy in the United States and other countries. Readers who are interested in pursuing further any particular topic or theme are directed to the notes in the works cited here and in the six articles in this volume. I have chosen not to include pertinent government documents, but researchers should be aware of the harvest of information on drug policy that is provided by the U.S. government in the form of congressional hearings and reports, Department of State publications, and reports by the General Accounting Office.

A modern history of international drug control remains to be written. Thematically suggestive, however, is Arnold H. Taylor, *American Diplomacy and the Narcotics Traffic, 1900–1939: A Study in International Humanitarian Reform* (Durham, N.C., 1969). Taylor demonstrates that, despite the worthy objective of international control, political and economic considerations often prevented interested powers from adopting effective anti-narcotics accords. No author has addressed domestic constraints on drug policy more authoritatively than David F. Musto, M.D., in *The American Disease: Origins of Narcotic Control* (New Haven, 1973; expanded ed., New York, 1987). Musto's book remains the starting place for all who write about U.S. drug policy.

Nearly as influential as Musto is David T. Courtwright, *Dark Paradise: Opiate Addiction in America before 1940* (Cambridge, Mass., 1982);
