lines are often invented or added from elsewhere in the sequence to establish the nature of characters relationships A further reason for abridgment is that Shakespeare assumed that his audiences would be familiar with the Henry VI plays and frequently made indirect references to events in them such as Richard's murder of Henry VI or the defeat of Henry's queen Margaret
