However, many tornadoes go the extra mile, appearing in places where you least expect them. In fact, some of the most unusual tornado sightings have occurred in the middle of the ocean.

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SLEEPING ON ICE

When the weather turns cold, most people going on vacation choose to travel to warm places where they can temporarily escape the winter chill. Beach resort or island cruise, anyone? However, if you can't get enough of the snow and ice, perhaps you'd rather spend your winter vacation in the most wintry way possible – in an ice hotel!

An ice hotel is just what it sounds like: it's a hotel made entirely from snow and ice. Most commonly, it's built using a snow-ice mixture called snow ice, which is stronger and insulates better than snow or ice by itself. Most ice hotels are constructed using a steel frame, which is then filled in with the snow ice. When the steel frame is taken off, only a thick, sturdy, ice-walled building remains. Some ice hotels are structured like traditional hotels, while others offer guests the chance to stay in the over individual igloos. Regardless of style, all ice hotels depend for their existence on the temperature staying below freezing for the entire winter; consequently, there are only about 20 ice hotels in the world, and they are only found in places like Alaska, Canada, Sweden, Finland, Norway, and high elevations.

Walls aren't the only part of an ice hotel made from ice. Frozen food provides the building material for each chair, couch, table, desk, shelf, and light fixture inside the building as well. (Chairs and couches are covered with animal fur to make them comfortable for sitting.) Many ice hotels even offer amenities such as ice restaurants, bars, churches, and meeting rooms – all carved from solid ice, of course. Even small details like the cups in the ice restaurant are made of small chunks of ice if it can be made from ice, it probably is.

Yes – even the beds in an ice hotel are made of ice. Although it might sound like a nightmare, it's actually a pretty cool experience. In fact, many people who have stayed in an ice hotel say it was one of the most memorable experiences of their lives.
